

### Luke 6:35, Syriac Peshitta:

But love your enemies, do good to them, lend to them, and do not cut off any person's hope.

Most witnesses have, "love your enemies, do good to them, and lend expecting nothing in return" ( $\mu\eta\delta\dot{\epsilon}\nu\,d\pi\epsilon\lambda\pi\dot{\epsilon}\lambda\sigma\tau\epsilon$ ). However, a very few (e.g. W  $\Xi$  sys) have a text that supplies a personal object for the verb ( $\mu\eta\delta\epsilon\nu\alpha$ ), thereby requiring a different meaning for the verb, "to disappoint," or more literally, "to cut off one's hope." The Peshitta and the Sinaitic manuscript of the Old Syriac clearly share this distinctive text.

### Daniel 11:16, Revised Standard Version:

But he who comes against him shall take the actions he pleases, and no one shall withstand him. He shall take a position in the beautiful land, and all of it shall be in his power.


### Daniel 11:16, Syriac Peshitta:

The one who comes against him will do whatever he pleases, and none will stand before him. He will arise in the land of Israel, and it will be delivered into his hands.

Where is "the beautiful land?" The apocalyptic prophecy of Daniel 11 is ambiguous in the original Hebrew, but the Syriac version of the text provides a clear answer.





### New Perspectives on Ancient Nubia

Knowledge of the societies of ancient Nubia is regrettably narrow. Egyptologists tend to interpret Nubian political and social achievements as derivative of Egypt as a result of the prejudices of ancient royal propaganda as well as modern views of "Egyptian exceptionalism." Academic discourse about the ancient world renders Nubia all but invisible. Located at the nexus of the Nile Valley and savannah corridors, ancient Nubian peoples traded east African goods to Egypt, the eastern Mediterranean, and the Near East. The powerful Kushite empire attained political hegemony over Egypt in its 25<sup>th</sup> Dynasty (ca. 760–656 BCE), which saw the Kushite pharaohs engaging in international displays of power in the Levant, bringing them into direct conflict with the Assyrian empire. Commentary on these clashes is recorded in the Hebrew Bible, while the Christian New Testament speaks of the conversion of a treasurer of the "Candace of the Aethiopians". This volume presents current research that centers Nubian history and archaeology and imparts this information from postcolonial and anti-racist perspectives. ### A History of the Study of Grammar among the Syrians



This book is a translation of a monograph about the Syriac grammatical tradition, the *Historia artis grammaticae apud Syros*, by the 19th-century German theologian and linguist, Adalbert Merx.

The book traces the ways in which Syriac scholars in Late Antiquity learned to analyse their own language and to adapt the techniques of Greek grammar to their own Semitic language. Starting with early translations of Greek works, Merx traces the innovations introduced by Jacob of Edessa and the development of accentuation and pointing. He also covers the contributions of Eastern and Western Syriac scholars such as Hunayn ibn Ishaq, Joseph bar Malkon, and John bar Zu<sup>c</sup>bi, taking the story up to the time of Barhebraeus. The relationships of Syriac with Greek, Hebrew, and Arabic traditions are all carefully considered. The current edition has been extensively annotated in order to bring the reader up-to-date with research carried out since Merx published his ground-breaking work. The texts that were included in the original have also been re-published afresh, including the fragments of Jacob of Edessa's famous *Grammar*.



the Great) and Dionysios Bar Salibi authored their own original works and translated Greek and Arabic writings into Syriac. However, then as now, grand ecclesiastical plans sometimes fell short of real life application. This time period was also a significant one in secular history, with Crusaders, Muslims, and Mongol khans battling for control of the Middle East. After scouring the available Syriac chronicles from the Syriac Renaissance, Peter Kawerau has summarized both the stated ideals and lived realities of ecclesiastic structures and interactions between Syriac-speaking Christians and their neighbors of other traditions and faiths. This translation, based on Kawerau's 1960 edition, updates some of the language used and makes this work available to English speaking students, scholars, and interested laity.

Codex Washingtonianus: An Analysis of the Textual Affiliations of the Freer Gospels Manuscript draws a text-critical picture of one of the most complex Greek manuscripts of the Gospels. The monograph presents a detailed examination of the textual features of Codex Washingtonianus in all

four Gospels, paying special attention the manuscript's primary feature: block mixture. In the early 1900s, Henry A. Sanders was the first to notice that Codex W shifts textual affinities numerous places in the manuscript, creating textual blocks. Sanders delineated the textual blocks still accepted and used today. This study examines and evaluates these textual blocks and assesses the quantitative relationship(s) between W and other Gospel manuscripts from various textual traditions. The quantitative assessment is supplemented by an investigation of W's other properties: paratextual features, orthographic variations, and scribal tendencies. Codex W is the paradigm of a block-mixture manuscript, and its textual blocks are fully displayed in nearly every characteristic. W's block mixture was first observed by Sanders, but it has not been thoroughly explored until now. As a result, this research not only addresses block mixture as a text-critical phenomenon, it also illuminates the character of one of the New Testament's most unique manuscripts.
